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
Fire research

Refusal as Research Method in Discard Studies




This image is the Facebook profile photo of a 'Stop the Dump Fires' group in the Arctic community of Iqaluit, Nunavut. It features a pregnant Inuk woman and activist, and was taken during a four month long dump fire that occurred during the summer of 2014. During the fire, pregnant women and women of childbearing age were warned not to go outside due to risks caused by dioxins. The Inuktitut syllabics written on her hand read 'Taima' or 'enough', referring to the decades of government underfunding that contributed to this and many other dump fires. The image is an example of refusal, as it refuses to depict Inuit as passive victims of slow violence and redirects attention towards government institutions. 

The *We Are Fire* Toolkit is an online knowledge product that invites you to learn about and explore uses of fire on the land





Guiding value statements and practices


- 1. Responsiveness to Indigenous needs
